

Hidden Histories: Sourcing the Past

A residential course for A-level students

This course sets out to inspire and challenge you in a non-competitive environment, mixing with like-minded students from across the UK and tutored by two subject experts. Participation can be acknowledged under *Preparation for HE* on your UCAS application form.

Objectives

- o To explore multiple and contested historical narratives
- o To study the ways in which history is recorded and handed down
- To critically examine the authenticity and reliability of primary sources as evidence of historical fact

Format

- From the fall of Rome to the transatlantic slave trade, this course will encourage students to investigate the challenges involved in historical research, within an interdisciplinary framework that incorporates textual, visual and multimedia elements. Students will be engaged in lively group discussions, presentations, debates and workshop activities.
